Their first collaborative work "Persephone's Gate" was exhibited at the Los Angeles Centre for Digital Art in June 2016. Intrigued by the myth of Persephone and the Tuatha de Danann, they began to develop the script for As I Went Down To The River Styx.

From May to September they worked intensively, shooting thousands of images, improvising and reshooting when required until they had sufficient material to produced prints for the upcoming exhibition in the Inspire Gallery, a book and a DVD. The monologues for the DVD were written collaboratively in the spring of 2017 and filmed in May.

Leon Quinn from Reverb Studios came on board the project as animator/editor for the DVD, with music composed by Paul McCormack.




Mary Rose Callaghan Writer

(Attic Press, 1990); Emigrant Dreams (Dublin, Poolbeg Press, 1996), republished as I Met A Man Who Wasn't There (New York, Marion Boyars, 1997); The Last Summer (Poolbeg, 1997); The Visitor's Book (Dingle, Brandon, 2001); and Billy Come Home (Brandon, 2007).



As well as writing extensively for periodicals, she has published Kitty O'Shea: A Life of Katherine Parnell (London, Pandora Press, 1980, San Francisco, Pandora, 1994). She has been assistant editor of, and wrote thirty articles for The Dictionary of Irish Literature, edited by Robert Hogan (Greenwood Press, 1979 and 1997), and has broadcast several stories on BBC radio. She was runner-up in the first Maxwell House Prize in 1979.
